**Statement of
Significance**

The house is a fine example of the Craftsman/Bungalow style built early on the Westside for Carl Eugene and Bertha Mae Woodard. Woodard worked for Springer Mills and is listed as a teamster at this address in 1919 and by 1932 was listed as a salesman. The Woodards lived in the house until the late 1930's.

**Description of

Appearance**

Historic Features: 1. One story wood frame bungalow on a concrete block foundation. 2. Shallow gable roof has wide bracketed eaves, exposed rafters and wide gable-end fascia boards. 3. Walls are clad with narrow clapboards. 4. A commodious porch has tapered square columns resting on brick piers and low clapboard walls. The porch wraps around the front (north) and east sides, sheltering the main entry door. 5. The paneled door is flanked by paired double-hung sash with one-over-one lights. 6. Other fenestration is similar double-hung. 7. French doors on the east facade. Non-historic additions: 1. Newer deck on the east side.
