Statement of Significance Part of the Maple Park Addition platted by Hazard Stevens, son of first Territorial Governor Isaac Stevens, the property was sold to William Morford in 1908. Morford is identified as a carman for Olympia Light and Power Company. Neighbors have noted that he was the first conductor for the streetcar line. Another resident of the house was George L. Harrigan who was, according to longtime neighborhood residents, the uncle of singer Bing Crosby and bandleader Bob Crosby. The story is that the song "Harrigan" was in his honor. Both Crosby's visited their uncle there. The property was later owned by Edgar and Jean Sanford and sold to Joseph Mallery in 1943. The house was the home of State Supreme Court Justice Joseph A. Mallery, who served on the high court for 20 years from 1942 until 1962. The house was sold in 1962 to Bill T. Brumsickle and Mary Ann Brumsickle. Brumsickle is was a state representative.

Description of Physical Appearance Historic Features: 1. Two story four-square style house set on a concrete foundation. 2. Bell-cast hipped roof with wide eaves and decorative brackets. 3. Full-width front porch with hipped shed roof. Porch is supported by sculptured pillars, forming rounded arches and a low balustrade. 4. Southeast corner of first floor is recessed with a tripartite window. 5. Fenestration is generally one over one sash windows. 6. Craftsman style front door with newer stained glass. 7. Small one-story rear extension. Non-historic additions 1. Newer rear deck.
