Statement of Significance Mary Hurley came to the US from Ireland at 11 years of age. The Hurleys moved to Mason County in about 1883. Mrs. Hurley moved to a house at State and Puget after her husband Dennis died in 1902. Widow Mary Hurley had this house built ca. 1911. The home, located on the streetcar line, was both the family home and a boarding house. The Hurley family was active in St. Michael's Church. The home, remodeled in 1937, originally had a wrap around porch and an iron fence.

Description of Physical Appearance Two story four-square style home set on a concrete foundation. The house sited on a corner lot has narrow clapboard cladding and one over one sash windows. There is a porch on the west facade which has a slanted roof, plain railings and square posts. There are two main entries to the house
