**Statement of Significance**

The Goss House is a local Register property in the South Capitol Historic District. This Craftsman Bungalow was built in 1915 by Orville C. and Mamie (Mary) E. Goss. Mr. Goss was the Superintendent of Schools for Thurston County in 1915 and the principal of Lincoln School. Orville C. and Mamie (Mary) Goss owned the house from 1915-1930. The house retains many of its original features, including front gable, wide bracketed eaves with exposed rafter ends, rectangular bay on west side and tripartite and other windows with one over one sash

**Description of Physical Appearance**

Rectangular, once story, Craftsman Bungalow style house with front gable. Original wooden porch post replaced with brick. Wide bracketed eaves with exposed rafter ends. Rectangular bay on west side. Small projecting front porch with enclosed gable and bracketed roofline is offset to the right shelter's entry. Tripartite and other windows have one over one sash.
