

## First Printing *Water Woods & Prairies* Historic Content Updates:

- Pg. 62, Col. 1: . . . Yelm; Thomas Linklater, who had been head shepherd for the Company at Tenalquot near Rainier, settled there with his wife Mary.
- Pg. 65, Col. 1: Insert note 20 after families. Beginning with "A great many . . ." should be the whole quote.
- Pg. 66, Col. 2: . . . with Simmons-Bush party in 1845 and later settled at Nisqually by 1847.
- Pg. 73, Col. 2: . . . townspeople gathered in Olympia to hear a notable patriotic oration from attorney Daniel R. Bigelow.
- Pg. 81, Col. 2: John Swan, an 1850 newcomer, . . .
- Pg. 82, Col. 1: . . . law practice. Daniel Bigelow was a member of the first Washington Territorial Legislature . . .
- Pg. 93, Col. 2: . . . in 1995, South Puget Sound Community College added a Lacey branch campus at Hawks Prairie. In 2015, the branch campus moved to a larger facility on 6th Avenue in Lacey.
- Pg.93, Col. 2: Pg. 94, Col. 1: . . . people who ranged widely on seasonal rounds to gather food. The site is known to have been part of an overland trail used by American Indians and later by the Hudson's Bay Company as early as 1824. Stephen and Deborah Hodgdon claimed land in 1852 in Tenino. Others soon joined them . . . 1860.
- Permanently replacing the earlier names of Hodgdon's Station and Coal Bank, the Northern Pacific Railroad (NPRR) built a depot with the official name of "Tenino," in 1872. NPRR already owned an Upper Columbia and Snake River steamboat named "Tenino" after the band of Native Americans that once lived near The Dalles and Celilo Falls in Oregon. (note 62)
- Page 140, Col. 2: Note is 33.
- Page 147: . . . their daughter, Ruby, later renowned Seattle jazz performer Ruby Bishop (1919-2019), was born.
